#### Description:

Creativity, conscious observation, and approaching life as an art form are vital elements of perspective within each person's existence. This seminar will be an ongoing facilitated discussion as participants investigate the balance of one's creative identity with career choices, personal goals, awareness of the role of art in our lives, and conscious awareness of the environments through which we navigate. In the midst of the pace of the 21st century, a hectic daily schedule, unreasonable demands we feel obliged to meet imposed by ourselves and others, this course will present opportunities to slow down and connect with the everyday world while searching for the greater metaphor. Additionally, individual connection to creativity will be examined along with opportunities to explore the Central New York creative community. Note: it is not necessary to be in an arts-based major to participate, all disciplines welcome. Weekly journal entries and two short reflective papers will be required.

Sessions will include recorded and in-person accounts from gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgendered people who have survived the challenges of manifest prejudice to create lifestyles, relationships, and families on their own terms.

# HNR 220 Living With Dying

1 credits

#### Description:

The title of this seminar seems to be a paradox. How can we talk about dying and living in the same breath? We believe that the personal recognition of our mortality is a step toward engaging life to the fullest. Death anxiety is a barrier consciously or unconsciously that prevents us from making the most of opportunities in our work and family life. Unresolved grief over previous losses is an active element of such anxiety. Living with Dying may be the process that helps unlock more of your potential. This series is oriented toward "experiential learning," using your personal experience and that of others to explore various concepts and techniques that may be helpful in your journey.
